Welcome to the end of a very productive Term 3.

Staffing Update

Our junior students participated in an incursion from Wild Action Zoo on Thursday 4 September. They learnt about wildlife and developing a deeper connection to nature.

















Real Industry Job Interviews - Building Skills for the Future

On Tuesday 19 August, 31 students from the VCE Vocational Major program took part in the HWLLEN (Hume Whittlesea Local Learning and Employment Network) Real Industry Job Interviews at the Sunbury Global Learning Centre. This event gave students the chance to step into a professional setting, practise real interview skills, and receive personalised feedback from industry professionals.

These experiences directly connect to the VCAA requirements for VCE-VM Work Related Skills (Unit 2, Area of Study 2), where students must demonstrate their ability to:

- Explore and apply strategies that support future employment
- Practise employability skills such as communication, planning and self-management
- Reflect on strengths, areas for improvement and future pathways

Runner Excursion

As part of our Year 8 English studies, students have been exploring Runner, a gripping novel by Robert Newton set in 1919 Melbourne that follows the journey of 15-year-old Charlie Feehan. To deepen their understanding of the novel's historical context and themes, our Year 8 cohort participated in an immersive excursion on Wednesday 13 August.

The day began with a guided walking tour through key locations featured in the book, including the bustling streets of Richmond and the historic laneways that once formed the backdrop to Squizzy Taylor's world. Students were able to connect the novel's setting to real places, gaining insight into the living conditions, social issues and community spirit of post–World War I Melbourne.





Highlights included visiting old buildings, learning about the city's rich history, and seeing first-hand the contrast between Melbourne's working-class neighbourhoods and its wealthier districts. Students were encouraged to reflect on how environment shapes character, and many remarked on how these experiences brought Charlie Feehan's world vividly to life. The rest of the day was spent basking in the sun at Treasury Gardens before heading back home.

I would like to thank the staff who helped organise this engaging and educational opportunity, and our Year 8 students for their enthusiasm and thoughtful participation throughout the day.
