Dear Sunbury Downs College Community,

Welcome to the commencement of Term 3. This term is an important one for all students especially our Year 12 students as they work towards completing and finalising course work and assessments. For the College, we begin preparing for 2023 in earnest.

Pleasingly, enrolments for Year 7 in 2023 are increasing compared to the previous two years and we are planning an additional home group at this year level in 2023. We are continuing to receive enquiries about our teaching and learning program and school tours with the Principal are scheduled when requested.

We continue to follow the advice provided by the Department of Health and Department of Education to always ensure that the health and wellbeing of our students, staff and wider community remains the highest priority. The Rapid Antigen Test kit distribution will continue until the end of term 3. We thank the College community for their support with following the health advice provided by the Department of Health. Daily notifications to the community via Compass will continue when positive COVID cases are reported to the school.

School Wide Positive Behaviour Program

This initiative has been formally launched to the community during the return to school assembly and related promotional activities for students including year level assemblies in Term 3. The feedback from staff and students so far to the College values reward token system and being recognized in front of their peers has been excellent. The College is optimistic about the positive impact that this program will have for students and their learning.

Debating and Public Speaking

The final round of debating and public speaking took place on Monday 25 July 2022. Year 8 students were successful by default in the final round. Year 9 students were victorious, led by Prisha Maini. Throughout the season, both teams won three rounds, lost one round and were required to forfeit due to COVID on one occasion. Both teams competed against up to 20 different teams over the course of the competition.

Ace Program

On Tuesday 5, Wednesday 6 and Thursday 8 July multiple students participated in a 3-day online Wired Writing Workshop run by GERRIC at the University of New South Wales. Students completed a variety of workshops, including Ancient Egyptian mathematics, geometry, how to make papyrus paper at home, learning how to code non-linear stories in TWINE, and exploring the use of machine learning and the direction it may take us towards artificial intelligence.

I enjoyed the GERRIC Workshop a lot, and if I was invited again, I would do it again. Thank you for giving me this experience and letting me try out the GERRIC program.

Overall, I think the workshop was an amazing way to connect with new people and learn many things. This would also help later on when we learn about Ancient Egyptian mathematics. I met a lot of new people and discovered a whole new world of mathematics. I would definitely recommend this program to other people who want to expand their knowledge beyond school.

Throughout the GERRIC Wired Writing Workshop, we explored several new ways to write a story, whether it be a random story generator in Excel with over 32 million stories, or an entirely code based choose your own adventure story (my personal favourite activity). We also looked at a couple writing topics such as character and genre and delved deeper into them. I learnt a lot throughout the workshop, especially about Excel and Twine (the program used for the choose your own adventure stories) and would love to continue learning them myself to make fun, interactive stories that few people know how to make. I really enjoyed the Workshop and would recommend it to students in the future.

I thought that the GERRIC Workshop was good and that it had a good range of information, but I think they could have made it more productive by making the zoom sessions shorter, and they should have taught us more thoroughly than just spending some time on one and then moving onto something that was more complicated.

This workshop taught me some of the machine learning techniques such as reinforcement learning, supervised learning, and unsupervised learning and we had a few practical activities related to these concepts. One of the activities was to teach an artificial intelligence to sort between trash in the ocean which used supervised learning. The whole Workshop was conducted on zoom and the teacher explained concepts the group didn't understand with an added extra layer of detail on the concept.

Building Number Sense – Focus on Subtraction Strategies


In addition to our core topics, Year 7 and 8 classes are incorporating activities to help develop flexible thinking using a range of strategies to solve problems without calculators.

Story Time



This term in Year 8 ACE English we have been studying William Golding's Lord of the Flies. As a way of understanding the plot of the novel, we looked at several children's picture books and mapped their plots on Freytag's pyramid. Later we compared these narrative arcs to the plot development in Lord of the Flies, looking for differences and similarities.

The students and I enjoyed pretending that we were back in Prep, sitting on the ground, enjoying story time. One of our favourites was Stinky Jack and the Beanstalk, which the students helped me act out with puppets. Special thanks to Ms Brown for lending me her puppets!

One of the most interesting parts of this experience for me was rediscovering picture books as a distinct part of storytelling media. It is easy to think of these books as something that only children should read, but two of the books that we read had much wider appeal. In particular, Armin Greder's The Island is a fantastic and highly relevant allegory for xenophobic intolerance, and it is brilliantly and hauntingly illustrated.












NAIDOC Week





